Last year we celebrated a milestone of 60 years of growing our community. While our anniversary may be over, our growth hasn't stopped. As an organization, we're on a collective journey of building new paths as well as embracing new thinking and approaches.

Part of this growth was saying goodbye to a piece of our past with the sale of our day program buildings in Wardsville. While that chapter is closed, we honour its history, roots and identity.

Even though change is constant, one thing that remains is our commitment to supporting individuals to learn and grow. That has been a constant theme throughout our history.

I have to admit, there have been some bumps in the road this last year. Staffing capacity remains an issue for not only us, but sector wide.

With no provincial investment for base funding in decades, we're also struggling with funding and financial security. This led to the developmental services sector lobbying for a 5% increase to base funding through the #5tosurvive campaign.

While we did receive a 3% increase, it's still not enough to meet the increased costs to deliver services or address the financial pressures for the individuals we support, their families and our staff. We all know how expensive groceries, gas, and other essentials have become. It's even more challenging when funding has remained stagnant for decades.

We, along with other developmental services organizations,



continue to lobby the provincial government for a meaningful increase in funding.

Inclusive future

Despite our funding challenges, we're proud of the many positive outcomes this last year. If you follow us on Facebook or receive our quarterly newsletter, you've seen the numerous stories and photos of individuals living their best lives – hanging out with friends, being active in the community and making a difference in the world.

These are all steps forward in our vision for having a truly inclusive community for all members.

We are grateful for the incredible group of staff and family members who are walking with them and lifting each other up.

I'm happy to report we've welcomed several new staff. It's exciting to have fresh perspectives, combined with years of experience and wisdom. And we have drawn upon our experience, wisdom and innovative thinking to support people in constructing new pathways. This is at the heart of person directed supports.

As the executive director, I continue to be impressed with the strides our organization is making to help people with developmental disabilities live their best lives. Thank you for your support in our journey.




