

It's a true statement that time doesn't stand still. As we complete another year end, I'm always amazed at how we continue to evolve as an organization. We're moving away from a time of rapid change to one that's more intentional and gradual. This allows us to deepen our supports so that we're more responsive to people and not programs.

Each year I see how people are experiencing so many opportunities that weren't as available during our time of congregate supports. If you follow our Facebook page, you'll see that people have participated in things they love to do such as gardening, travel, attending theatre and concerts, creating art, joining in sports events, exercising, and participating in community craft events.

Often times these events end with sharing a drink with friends at the local Tim Hortons. These are activities that we all enjoy. Adopting a model of individual supports means that people can experience what is meaningful to them and not just what we have to offer.



That being said, we must continue to navigate the pressures that are also naturally occurring. There are 52,000 Ontarians with disabilities on the waitlist for services due to serious funding shortfalls within our sector.

This year we held our first job fair. While staffing capacity remains an issue, we've been fortunate to welcome many new staff over year. Our agency, like many others, is faced with increasing costs without the increase in funding to meet the needs.





We're also seeing an increase in demand for Passport services. As we experience these times, we need to look at how we can continue to evolve to meet existing demands while keeping in mind the future of Journey to Belonging.

Planning for the future

Quad County operates under a Letters Patent and Articles of Incorporation. These have not been updated since our inception in 1963. There was also a requirement for us to meet the standards of the Ontario Nonprofit Corporations Act (ONCA).

This past year, the Board of Directors embarked on updating all of these requirements to reflect the transformation from where we started to where we are today. This was a significant amount of work and I would like to thank the board for all of their time and efforts. We also welcomed a new board member, Kelly Lawley, in the role of director.

There has also been a significant amount of work by the Quadco and Quad County boards to complete a transfer of duplexes from Quadco to Quad County. The original intent of Quadco is no longer necessary and we thank the Board of Directors for their time over the years.



The exhibit on the art wall, created by multiple Ouad County artists, was well received and generated wonderful feedback from the community.


